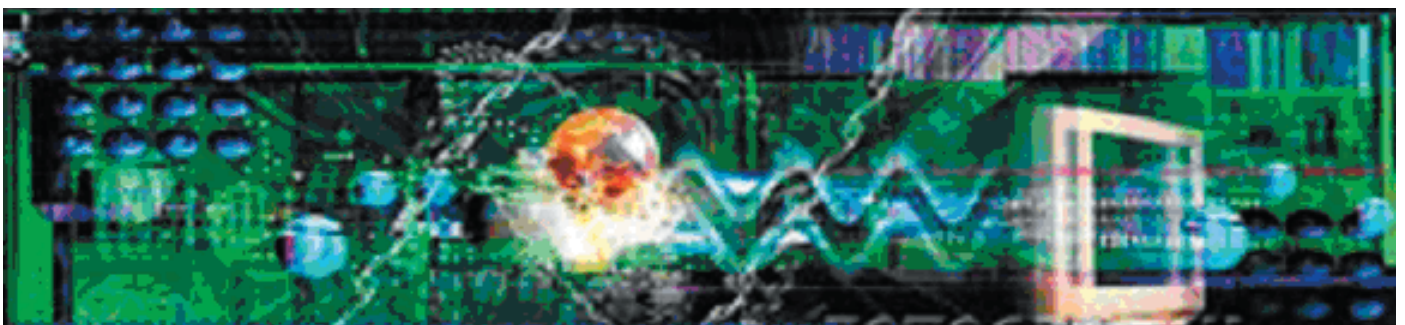

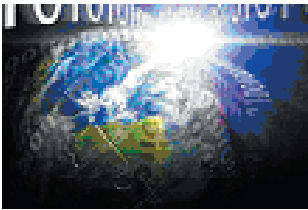

Nick Bleech, IT Security Director, Rolls Royce (UK)



Nick joined Rolls-Royce in 2005 following a 20-year career in security during which he held a number of senior posts: in KPMG's information risk management practice, EDS Defence, and the UK Security Service. He leads the Jericho Forum's Meta-Architecture Working Group and was the lead author of the Jericho Forum's Visioning White Paper, which was published in February 2005. He is currently a member of the Jericho Forum's Board of Management where his breadth and depth of knowledge in the field of IT security is put to very good use.

David Lacey, Director of Information Security, Royal Mail (UK)



David has over 30 years' experience in IT including more than 20 years' professional experience in Information Security management in both government and industry. Prior to joining Royal Mail in 1999, David was responsible for Information Security policy and standards for the UK Foreign & Commonwealth Office and the Royal Dutch/Shell Group. David is a keen futurist and innovator, responsible for pioneering many new initiatives in Information Security and IT Management, including the development of BS7799 and its associated certification schemes.

David McCaskill, Manager, IT Infrastructure & Governance, Procter & Gamble (US)



David is responsible for Procter & Gamble's corporate Identity Access Management infrastructure, systems, and services. He also participates in various industry forums and is a member of the SAFE-Biopharma Association Board of Directors. He has held several technical and managerial positions over his 19 year P&G career including Health & Beauty Care Global IT Architect and Global ERP Integration Architect. He holds a BS in Information & Computer Science from the Georgia Institute of Technology and is an occasional speaker and panelist on middleware, identity access management, & deperimeterized security issues.

John Meakin, Group Head of Information Security, Standard Chartered Bank (UK)



John leads a global information security team at Standard Chartered Bank, one of the world's most international banks with 30,000 employees in more than 50 countries and a management team comprised of 70 nationalities. He has 18 years' experience in information systems security. His specialty is modeling and managing the costs and benefits of security for large businesses, particularly enabling dynamic management and monitoring instead of traditional static prevention processes. Previously, he led systems security policy and strategy for Reuters, the Royal Bank of Scotland, Swiss Bank Corporation, and the investment-banking arm of Dresdner Bank. He has a PhD in Experimental Solid State Physics from Cambridge University.

Shane Tully, Information Security Architect, Qantas (Australia)



Shane is a 19-year veteran of the ICT industry with a strong technology and security background, and is a long time contributor to information technology security through his involvement in QANTAS, oneworld, Australian and international organizations such as the Jericho Forum. He is currently an Infrastructure Security Architect in Qantas IT. He is the founder of the oneworld Technical Forum, and is the coordinator within Qantas for this forum in the oneworld airline alliance. He is also currently involved in the oneworld Information Security Forum and the oneworld Innovation Forum.

Stephen Whitlock, Chief Architect for Information Protection & Assurance, The Boeing Company (US)



Steve is responsible for Boeing's enterprise information protection strategy and architecture. His background includes development of system security testing tools and publications on cryptography, information, and network security. For many years he functioned as an internal corporate consultant on cryptographic and security issues. He is an active participant in the security activities of the International Information Integrity Institute (I-4), Internet Engineering Task Force, and The Open Group, where he was chair of the Security Forum for four years. He holds a BS in electronic engineering technology from the Weber State University and an MS in software engineering from Seattle University.
